In the early days of AA, the groups were so afraid that everyone was going to get drunk and the groups would fold, that they created a lot of membership rules. If you recall, the Middleton Group had Rule 62! They thought the 'rules' protected them, but they did not.

We have benefited from their mistakes because they admitted they made bad choices, and they changed their approach. When the Traditions were introduced in 1946 in a Grapevine article, some members were not on board with adopting them, but they were accepted at the first International Convention in 1950 in Cleveland. The Third Tradition removed our need to make membership rules and thank God it did!

As a result of those Traditions, our groups do not have to look or operate like their neighboring groups. The diversity that allows is critical to the balance Alcoholics Anonymous offers us. Hopefully, there is a group that fits the needs of every alcoholic in our city, our state, our nation and, indeed, our world.
